

THE PROPHECY OF ZEPHANIAH by Mark Allfree


The prophecy of Zephaniah is probably not a section of the scriptures that occupies our attention a great deal. In our English Bible it consists of three short chapters, comprising a total of only fifty three verses. There are

fifty three verses. There are no major New Testament quotations from Zephaniah's prophecy. Yet for all its brevity it is no less the word of God. We discover that Zephaniah is not just an obscure prophecy, dealing with certain specific events pertaining to the kingdom of Judah in the days of king Josiah. His prophecy has a much wider scope – he speaks of the time when apostasy will be eradicated from the whole earth, and the scattering of the nations that took place at Babel in Genesis 11 as a result of the work of Nimrod will eventually be reversed, resulting in all nations of the earth being united and reconciled to God. This is really the substance of Zephaniah's message.

THE EPISTLE TO THE COLOSSIANS by Mark Allfree




explored at length.

THE DAY OF PENTECOST by Mark Allfree


An exposition of the apostle

time, and their main purpose was to enable the early christians to effectively witness to the truth of the


resurrection of Jesus Christ.

God. The prophecy of Nahum illustrates how that the repentance of the Ninevites did not last, and the the destruction of Nineveh was foretold in the Bible. This prophecy has been accurately fulfilled, and this is a powerful proof that the Bible is the word of God. The downfall of Nineveh is seen as foreshadowing the future destruction of the kingdom of men prior to the establishment of the God's Kingdom on earth.



EXPOSITORY NOTES ON PAUL'S LETTER TO THE EPHESIANS by John Allfree


This is a reprint of Bro John Allfree's notes on the Epistle to the Ephesians. They were first produced in 1973 to accompany series of talks given at a Bible Study Weekend in Toronto. They achieved a limited circulation in North America, and were

then serialise in the Bible Student Magazine, and in 1978 were published in book form by VCE Publications,

Canada. They have been out of print for some years, but have been reprinted in response to requests for their republication.

The book represents an attempt to expound the principal themes of the Epistle to the Ephesians, and is not intended to be an exhaustive exegetical verse-by-verse commentary.

The final chapter seeks to extract from the apostle's words counsel to meet the needs of the 21st century disciple, and encouragement to those who seek to "be strong in the Lord and in the power of his might".




CHALLENGES TO CONSCIENCE by UK Christadelphian Military Service Committee

JUST ANOTHER RUNAWAY SLAVE by Jonathan Cope



This book contains fifty-two short reflections on various aspects of of the year. With only about 600 words, we can read each one in just two or three minutes. Now is the


time to pause what we're doing for a moment, ponder our lives and prepare for the coming of our Lord.

Have you ever wondered why so many people have different ideas about the Bible? How could one book inspire such disparate concepts and interpretations? Bro. Jason explores why methodology matters: even though the passages in the Bible don't change from person to person,



their interpretation does. Yet, the Bible was not intended to be read in whatever way one might want. This book presents a specific methodology for determining what the Bible meant when it was written, and to whom it was written. From there, it suggests ways that the message can apply today—how the depth and power of the Bible can be understood in its original context and in its meaning for today.



IN SEARCH OF A BIBLICAL FAITH by Reg Carr


How did the Christadelphian faith come into existence? That is the question this book sets out to answer, through the letters of John Thomas to Alexander Campbell between 1833 and 1847.

It is well established that Dr. John Thomas (1805–71) was the means, under God, of 'rediscovering' in the nineteenth

century the original gospel of Jesus Christ and the teachings of the first-century Christian Church. But how and when did John Thomas come to understand what the Bible actually teaches? Did the key truths of the Christian gospel come to him all at once, 'fully formed'? Or did Dr. Thomas "search the Scriptures," as Jesus advised his contemporaries to do when he saw that their understanding was faulty (John 5:39)? And if the things "most surely believed among" the Christadelphians today owe their our spiritual life, one for each week origin, initially at least, to John Thomas' careful searching of the Bible—his "search for a biblical faith"—then why did he first join the Campbellite community, only to spend the best part of fifteen years discovering that many of their principal beliefs were not biblical?

THE HOUSE OF ASAPH by Roger Lewis

As a faithful family the House of Asaph had few equals, but as master musicians they were without peer. When did they develop such a strong spiritual standard? What was the secret that enabled them to show such passionate faithfulness for the Truth? How did they maintain such commitment for centuries of time? Why was their music so crucial to their history?



There were hidden secrets here, awaiting the scrutiny of earnest Bible students. But what blessing comes to those who meditate upon such things, for their story is an inspiration to encourage the best in family life, to build enthusiasm for the Truth, and to guard a household heritage. For those seeking to develop a faithful dynasty, there could be no finer example to ponder than the House of Asaph, a family of extraordinary commitment and zeal.

Twenty-four hours is not a long time. In this time, our Lord went from being a free man with the company of all his closest friends, to a crucified criminal, denied and forsaken by all.

"The Day Christ Died" is a consideration of the life of one man, on one day, on the very day that he knew he would die.


It was the last day that our Lord spent as a mortal being. He began it in a secluded session with his closest friends where he instituted the Last Supper. He then departed for a few hours of heartfelt meditation and prayer on the stony slopes of Olivet. Here amongst the olive groves, he steadied himself for the ordeal that he alone knew lay ahead. The betrayal by his familiar friend. The denial by another. The awful feeling of loneliness. Then the trials. The injustice and hypocrisy, the torture and abuse, the hatred and spite. The pain of the crown of thorns, the torture of carrying the cross, and the agony of death are almost incomprehensible in their brutality.

But amazingly through all this, his mind was clear, his character consistent.

This is a study of the mind of the greatest man to ever grace Israel's soil. We see him in some of his darkest moments, under the most intense pressure that any human being has ever been subjected to, and yet despite all this we see him ultimately in his greatest triumph.

Any contemplation of these last few precious hours of the life of our Lord will inevitably fall short in expressing the drama and the pathos of the day. This is left for each reverent reader to fill in during their lonely hours of meditation as we all count the cost of this supreme sacrifice.

These Notes, although verse-by-verse, have been written, we hope, in an easily readable style, so that this volume may be of use not merely as an expositional tool, but also as a devotional one as well.




THE KING IN YOUR HEART Samuel and the story of Israel's worst choice. by Paul Tovell

Around a thousand years before Christ, following the spiritually turbulent days of the judges, Israel asked for a king. The royal and holy nation desired one man to act as their figurehead and champion, instead of the LORD God. And the spark for this request was that the nations around them already had one.

This moment was a pivotal point in the history of Israel. The books of Samuel present it from all angles: we are told

how the request comes about, what problems the new king creates, why God responds with an alternative, and where the two incompatible kings clash. This story is so relevant to disciples too, since we face a similar choice. We must decide whether to let sin have dominion over us, ruling as a king in our hearts, as Paul says in Romans; or to enthrone God there instead. 



have promised to serve?






No Place for Christadelphians by Robin Lamplough

This book recounts the history of the Christadelphians in South Africa, through the turmoil of civil war, world wars and apartheid.






Gain new insights into the Bible's heroines!

The Leading Ladies Case Studies delve into the Biblical text of each heroine's story to unearth fine details, and deep patterns, previously unseen. We are thus challenged to see Rahab as the midwife of God's nation Israel; to see that Jael fulfills the

Eden covenant in precursor cameo; to see that Delilah was

assassinated; and to see that Esther completes her hidden agenda to remove the disgrace from the house of King Saul. Over-arching this we see the creation of Adam and Eve describing a harmonizing of the spiritual and the natural, a fusion of Heaven and Earth, with the woman emblemizing the Heavenly component and the man the Earthly one.

Seeing the Leading Ladies' stories together reveals that their accomplishments directly parallel the well-known feats of the greatest Biblical male heroes. Yet characteristically the women achieved their goals with fewer resources and less preparation time. The Ladies' victories are often unseen because they are encoded in the Bible record in a much quieter voice, which is God's own signature communication style.



Job's Quest: Student Edition by Ethel Archard


The fascinating topic of Job's guest raises the obvious question – what is that quest? Is it Job's desire to counter once and for all the claims of his "friends" that he is a wretched sinner? Is it his wish to have his complaints heard in a divine court of law where he feels sure of his vindication? Is it his aim to be accepted honorably once

more into the community? These elements, and perhaps several others, are clearly involved. But do they constitute the essence of the quest?

This study shows convincingly that the underlying structure of the book points in another direction. The chiastic structure focuses on Job 28 as the centerpiece around which the whole book is framed – the hymn to divine wisdom. The preceding part of the book deals with the quest for answers based on human thought, conversation, and reason. The subsequent part of the book focuses mainly, by sharp contrast, on divine revelation as essential to providing abiding answers and perspective to the human condition.

Studies in the Lord's Supper by Shawn Moynihan




Two thousand years ago, on a spring evening in an upper room in Jerusalem, thirteen people met together. Although this event is popularly known as the "Last Supper", it was actually the "First Supper". On the night he was betrayed, Jesus did something for the first time. He directed his disciples to come together, in the context of a

meal, to remember him, to affirm covenant commitments through self-reflection, and to proclaim his death. Jesus further stated that he expected his followers to participate in this ritual "often"; therefore, the Lord's Supper began in Jerusalem, continues to this day, and will extend into the kingdom (Luke 22:16,18).

This book attempts to recapture Jesus' intention for his Supper. Jesus established the rite to connect us to our Father, to connect us to him, and to connect us to each other. Like the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, we want to know Jesus in the Breaking of Bread (Luke 24:30-31).

Benjamin and Grace by Peter Ojike

Peter Ojike has written a powerful work that demonstrates the gracious hand of God in the life of Benjamin. He begins by examining the relationship between Benjamin and his older brother, Judah. Then he develops the story of the failure of the house of Saul, and the mercy to be shown to



David's son. He then takes us to the First Century, where Benjamin's Saul of Tarsus ravens as a wolf, but is transformed by the gospel of grace. Finally, Bro. Peter demonstrates how this will all culminate in the Kingdom of God, when Christ will sit on the throne of grace in Zion. Benjamin and his descendants teach us about grace in ways we may not learn from any other character in the Bible, apart from Christ.

The Women of Matthew 1 by George Booker

Matthew 1 traces Jesus' lineage forward from Abraham through to David. It emphasizes the great Jewish covenants and the progression of God's purpose, finally fulfilled in Jesus, who is the seed of Abraham and the king of Israel.

Here in Matthew 1 is a lengthy list of names, a list that can be very dull to read. But if we make the genealogy personal, it comes alive. Read the genealogy as though it were your own family history. It is! "For if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed (Gal 3:26-29), and heirs according to the promises" (Gal 3:16, 27-29).


When read that way, the boring list is immensely exciting. You suddenly discover that you are an heir to a vast inheritance — the whole world in fact (Gen 13:14, 15; Rom 4:13; 2 Sam 7:12-16) through an obscure branch of the family tree that you never knew about before. Just think: if you learned of this possible inheritance, with what excitement would you read and re-read that "dull", "dry" list of names, just to be sure that it did, in fact, lead finally to you? And then how eagerly and seriously would you go to work at the family's enterprise, knowing that one day it would all belong to you!

This then becomes our starting point to review the lives of the five women who are mentioned in this genealogy — Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and (last and most extraordinary of all) Mary, the mother of Jesus.
